## **Program:**

Ken Kamps introduced today's speaker, Larry Bowden, President of the American Breweriana Association, who provided us with the interesting history of the Platteville Brewery as well as the process of brewing beer.

Larry explained that in the 1800's everyone liked beer as it needed to be consumed before it spoiled due to the fact that there was no refrigeration. Therefore there were a lot of little breweries in the area. In the 1840's the Germans introduced logger beers, which lasted longer as they were kept in cold cellars. After the Civil War, the Platteville Brewer was built on 20 acres where the Swiss Valley building and the dog park are. The dog park area was used as an ice pond. The Brewery burned and was rebuilt.

Fritz Hoppe owned the Brewery in 1880 when it was prosperous and the beer was shipped by train. He retired in 1912 and sold the business. This was also the

time of Prohibition. Larry provided more dates about the sale of the building and the process the brewers used to produce their malt and hops. Competition from the larger Milwaukee breweries came with the increase train travel, making it hard for the little breweries to survive. The Brewery closed in 1937-38 and the building was used to make cheese. As they say the rest is history.
