<u>Joker Draw:</u> It was Charlie holding the lucky ticket when the number was announced; however, it was the 10 of diamonds that turned up.


Announcements:

Program: Thank you to Dan Engelke for arranging to have Jean Napp attend our meeting this morning and share her experience as an Astronomical League Master Observer and President of the Starsplitters of



A native of Platteville, Jean graduated from UW-Platteville and UW-Madison, and taught English as a second language in Middleton. Eventually Jean and her husband moved to a farm near Stitzer where she began to homeschool their three children. Jean was presented with an opportunity to look through a telescope and discovered the beauty of the night sky. The rest is history!

Jean's presentation was appropriately entitled, "Falling in Love with the Night Sky", which is exactly what she did when looking through that telescope for the first time. Jean knew immediately she was not presenting to a group of astronomers as they 'never get together this early in the morning'. Astronomers are usually preparing to go to bed at an early morning hour.

Some of the many areas covered by Jean, all of which you can see with the naked eye through a telescope, included seeing the 3 planets, Mars, Saturn and Jupiter. She touched on the constellations noting that they are seasonal. She provided pictures of the Milky Way, Northern Lights, comet and meteor showers, and the International Space Station. She shared stories of her experiences looking through a telescope, seeing stars



being born, stars disintegrating as clusters, visual siting of the rings around Saturn and others.

A most interesting image Jean provided was an aerial map of the United States at night. It was disbelieving how the night sky is illuminated by the millions and millions of lights across the country and serving little, if any, purpose. Jean shared several situations where light can and does have a negative effect on society and nature.

A very interesting presentation with time allowed for questions.
