Program: Beth Frieders finished out April, 3 for 3. She brought yet another amazing speaker to our meeting on Friday, Alex Harman. As the publisher, all I can say is "Beth, I'm really glad your month is done!" Kidding of course! The presentations from Beth's speakers were mesmerizing.

So much so, I found myself listening rather than keeping notes. Truthfully, the presentations were far beyond my biological background (ha ha). Thanks Beth for helping me to summarize.

Alex is closing in on the end of his junior year at UW-P. A Biology Major with focus on Ecology, Alex's most recent project has been a study to increase native plants for pollinators.

Approximately one year ago, the Honey Bee project arrived on campus, bringing in two colonies of bees. The program has had its ups and downs and since the beginning, Alex has been involved with the project. He shared very



interesting information; each colony has some 4,000 bees and can increase up to 80,000 bees. He provided information on the paper work necessary to acquire bees and supplies, shared that each hive has one Queen Bee and many, many worker bees. He stated that the Honey Bee is not native to

the United States but rather to Europe. Being a Biology Major with a focus on Ecology, Alex has traveled to and studied in Borneo, Panama, Australia and Galaspo Islands. With that being said, his study has focused on increasing plants in the United States that are important to the pollination by the Honey Bee. There are plans to receive 2 new hives shortly on campus. Currently all is going well with the existing hives as there is new larva and new eggs upon inspection of the hives. There were many, many questions and Alex was very informative. He demonstrated a sincere interest in his study of the Honey Bee and provided an outstanding presentation.
